ABOUT THE RING CYCLE

Wagner's Ring Cycle

Wagner's <u>Ring Cycle</u>, or *Der Ring des Nibelungen*, is widely recognised as the pinnacle of the operatic repertoire: an epic tale of gods, dwarves, dragons, heroes and a magic ring, all set to incredibly powerful music.

- The Ring Cycle comprises four operas; <u>Das Rheingold</u>, <u>Die Walküre</u>, <u>Siegfried</u> and <u>Götterdämmerung</u>, performed over the space of a week and totalling 15 hours of performance.
- Premiering in 1876, Wagner took approximately 26 years from 1848 to 1874 to compose the Ring Cycle, which includes over 2,000 pages of music.

This World First Digital Ring Cycle

- In a world first, this cutting-edge production uses digital scenery and costume elements to present a once-in-a-lifetime spectacular, immersive Ring Cycle like none ever seen before!
- The latest in video content creation techniques, audio-visual and lighting equipment is being used to create an awe-inspiring world. crew.

- 33 principals, including internationally acclaimed Wagner specialists
- 41 Opera Australia Chorus
- 124 musicians, including Queensland Symphony Orchestra and additional international Ring Cycle specialists
- 21 dancers including 7 Dancenorth dancers
- 350 total cast and crew this includes singers, dancers, designers, technicians, costume-makers and backstage staff

First Chinese Director

- Chen Shi-Zheng is the first Chinese director of a large scale, national opera company's production of the Ring
- The Ring Cycle was originally based on Norse mythology. Now, for the first time, Chinese mythology, design and technology will be woven into the production

DIGITAL RING CYCLE: TECHNICAL & STAGING FACTS

 27 semi-trailer loads of sets, staging, costumes and technical equipment has been shipped to Brisbane from Sydney

Video Content

- 1.4TB of video content has been produced for this Ring Cycle
- Video and graphic design content is displayed on LED screens on stage, as well as projected onto set pieces and performers
- Some of the video display is interactive: triggered by performers movement via sensors on their costumes
- The set requires an intricate integration of different systems that run different elements that includes moving the screens around the stage, flying performers and

- automated lighting and projection programs (this includes Notch, Raynok, Keneysis and Blacktrax)
- Content design is by 'Leigh Sachwitz and flora&faunavisions' (please include full credit where possible)

Screens

- 15 LED screens, 10m high x 1m wide make up a curved digital cyclorama at the back of the stage
- 8 LED screens glide around the stage into different configurations as dynamic set components
 - o 6 of these screens are 8m high x 2.5m wide
 - o 2 of these screens are 8m high x 2m wide
 - o These screens can move up to 200mm per second.
- The 23 LED screens are made up of 834 individual LED panels that collectively weigh almost 14 tonnes

Major Set Pieces

- Phoenix: Made from aluminium, the giant phoenix will fly 8 Valkyries, delivering them to the stage
- **Dragon**: with a spine of flames, the dragon is manoeuvred around the stage by performers and crew and is made up of 12m x 2.1m long pieces

Flying performers

- 2 performer flying trusses can fly 3 performers each at any one time
- 3 Rhinemaidens are flown in hip harnesses, completing choreography in the air crew.

WARDROBE & WIGS

- 207 costumes
- 10,000+ UV printed dots on the god's and dancer's costumes every element of these costumes, including linings, buttons and threads, had to be tested for UV sensitivity
- Approximately 250 hours of costume fittings
- 115 wigs hand-made by OA's wig-makers
- 700m of wool and over 1000m of printed trim on the chorus and dancers' costumes
- Over 1000 hand-punched holes in the chorus' leather belts and holsters
- 2000m of natural hemp rope was used to create the 3 Norn costumes
- 120m of dreadlocks make up the Erda costume. She is decorated with UV paint and the design is based on Oracle Bone Script, an ancient form of Chinese characters
- The Tarnhelm (helmet) is a replica of a NASA system that is used to deploy giant solar panels in space
- The Nibelungen head torches are genuine Swiss Army issue that have been painted and adapted for the dancers

LOCATION & VENUE

 The Ring Cycle will be performed at the Lyric Theatre (audience capacity is 2000) at Queensland Performing Arts Centre (QPAC)

- This is the first large-scale production of the Ring Cycle to be staged in Brisbane and QLD
- Opera Australia has moved the entire performing company to Brisbane, booking more than 7800 room nights to house performers, creatives and crew
